From the Principal's Desk

In leadership, as in life, it is important every once in a while to take time to stop and reflect on our core values, how we measure our success and where we are in achieving those goals. Reflection and thinking critically are core IB values and are equally applicable to leaders and teachers as to students. Our Senior Leadership team for 2016 - 17 spent this weekend together on a retreat, as we do every year at this time.

We reviewed our Guiding Statements, our Vision and Mission, questioning whether they are still fit for purpose and how well our actions align to their principles. These fundamental statements should be living documents that are looked at regularly and, where necessary, updated. We believe that whilst the core of our current Vision and Mission is sound, it does not give sufficient expression to the inclusivity of our school and its strong sense of community. We have made some suggested changes and will be consulting with staff, students and a sample of parents to get your input and perspective.

We are firmly committed to improving the quality and the outcomes of teaching and learning for the students. We discussed and defined accurately the distinctions between the definitions of 'Good', 'Very Good' and 'Outstanding' for Progress, Attainment and Teaching and Learning . If we are to raise standards we need to know exactly what we will need to do differently or better to see measurable improvement.

We also dedicated time to planning and a review of the calendar for next year. There

are periods when there is a great deal happening and, with all the leadership team involved, we sought, as much as possible to plan carefully to relieve those potential pressure points. With a full academic and extracurricular programme planned and our IB/CIS/ NEASC synchronised visit coming up next February it will be a year that requires detailed planning so that, from the students' and parents' points of view, everything runs smoothly.



It was good to welcome Dianne Vella, who will be our new DP coordinator and Shahid Hossein who will be our new Head of Technology Integration to our team. Both are very experienced in their roles and will have a great deal to contribute to our school. It was a full and busy strategic planning process and we all came away inspired for the

year ahead. We look forward to sharing our renewed enthusiasm and confirmation of our direction with you at 1 'The Road Ahead' meeting on 31 May at 6.00pm in the auditorium.





Science Department will be conducting two important events; Group 4 Project for Grade 11 Science students and Taaleem Science Fair for Grades 6-10.

Group 4 Project is a mandatory project where Grade 11 students from all the Sciences get together and run interdisciplinary projects. The project will take place over three days from Monday, 23 May 2016 to 25 May 2016. Group 4 project contributes 10 hours towards IB practical requirements. Grade 11 Science students' parents are encouraged to attend the exhibition in the school auditorium on the 25th May from 1: 00 pm to 2:30 pm.

We are pleased to announce that GCS will be hosting the <u>Taaleem Science Fair 2016</u> which will take place on Monday, 30th May, 2016. We are expecting around 100 young scientists from different Taaleem schools to showcase their projects under various categories of sciences and engineering including Science Working Model, Rube Goldberg Machine and Science Poster based on the theme of "Emirates Mars Mission 2021".

The event aims to encourage students of various age groups to participate and compete in challenging modules in the subjects of sciences and engineering. This event also aims to facilitate and boost social and intellectual interaction between brilliant minds of our generation. It is a great unique opportunity for the students to showcase their talent and achieve their deserved appreciation. We have invited several media outlets to cover the event and are expecting several members of the press to be in attendance.

The objectives of the Science Fair for the students are to;

Dear Parents,

I hope that my message finds you well and beginning to look forward to a long and well deserved summer break with your children. As we approach the end of the year I wanted to highlight for you some of the hard work and self-reflection that is currently going on in the background in the Primary School. We are a four programme IB World Continuum School and are immensely proud of this. In order to maintain this quality assurance stamp we will be receiving a visiting team in February 2017 who will look specifically at our programme provision and curriculum from an IB perspective. This will be combined with a synchronized visit from the CIS/NEASC.

Below is an overview of this process so you are more familiar with the terms.

CIS (Council of International Schools) is a membership community that works collaboratively to shape international education through professional services to schools, higher education institutions, and individuals. The CIS community includes more than 660 schools and 475 colleges and universities representing 109 countries.

Founded in 1885, the **New England Association of Schools & Colleges, Inc. (NEASC)**, is a very well established accrediting association whose mission is the establishment and maintenance of high standards for all levels of education, from pre-K to the doctoral level.

The CIS/NEASC accreditation process looks at all aspects of school life and in conjunction with our IB re-authorisation, teaching and learning is at the very heart of it. However the process also involves looking at a wider variety of aspects of school life for example; Governance & Leadership, Faculty & Support Staff and Operational Systems, all of which have a direct impact on the school community. We should in essence view the accreditation process as the vehicle for school improvement.

I would like to place on record my sincere thanks to Boyd Edmondson (Chair of the School Advisory Board), our staff members, administration / support staff and members of the Student Council who are currently involved working in our section committees that focus on the above aspects of school life at GCS.







From a parental perspective I would also like to take this opportunity to ask for your assistance and support in providing us with meaningful feedback. As part of our Self-Study for the accreditation visit in February 2017 all stakeholders are asked to fill in an online survey from the Endicott College Research Centre who work closely with the organisations who will be accrediting us.

The surveys are designed for students, parents, faculty and staff and are linked to their stated Accreditation Standards. The survey reviews the school in the following areas:

Academic Leadership School Climate School Environment Services

If you haven't done so already can you please follow an online link that will have been sent to you at your registered email address with the school. We need as high a response rate as possible from parents and the feedback we receive will be invaluable to help us with our Self-Study. Your help with this is greatly appreciated.

Dear Parents,

This academic year, one of our school's philosophies was that every teacher should be an EAL or SEN Teacher. It has been a rewarding journey. As a part of the Student Support Team, we've worked with most of our teachers, shared best practice and bounced ideas off one another. This year some of us have met every Tuesday morning where we have reflected on our teaching practice, listened, shared ideas and tried to help each other in areas which we've found difficult.

In one of our many sessions we focused on positive behaviour and how we can encourage that. One of our teachers found this great website which helped many others on how to reinforce positive behaviour in class. The website is Caught You Coupons, Rewards Coupons for Kids." Web. 23 May 2016. http://www.freeprintablebehaviorcharts.com/ caught you coupons.htm This is a great website to help parents and teachers to reinforce the behaviorisms we so greatly desire of our IB learners not only at school but most certainly at home and in the community at large.

Another great session was in regards to the importance of letter formation. There is much evidence through various researchers which suggest how letter formations impact reading, writing and mathematics. An Oxford Health NHS Occupational Therapy suggests to start by practicing letter formations which are grouped into families.

> Teach letter formation using 'families of letters: e.g. start with the easiest first (long letters): l, t, i, u, j, y. Then go onto the next easiest letters (curly letters): c, a, g, q, o, e, f, s. Then the 'bouncing ball' letters: r, n, m, p, h, b, d. And finally the 'zig zag letters: v, w, x, k, z. Most British schools like to teach lower case letters first, then work on capitals.

One of the many tools we use here at school are Jolly Phonics and Ground, green and sky alphabets!

The 'Ground, green, and sky alphabets is a great way to show the children how some alphabets may touch the sky, all of them will be on the green grass and some may go below to the ground!

Another great session which we have discussed in our Inclusion Champions workshops is Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD). This disorder has its relations with the brain and it affects areas of inattention, hyperactivity and/or impulsivity. Please find below some tips on how to best work with children who may have ADHD.

The first is believing in your child! It is imperative that we believe that the child can learn, mature and succeed in his/her own time! Another area is to pick your battles! If your child has done two out of three chores, then be proud that he/she has completed two chores!

Lastly, keep things in perspective and remember that the behaviour is related to the disorder and most of the time it is not intentional. It is very important to praise good behaviour and speak about any consequences if there is undesirable behaviour.

It has been a pleasure to work with such great human beings who have the heart to teach! The hearts that we touch are precious and by caring for all needs we will hopefully make a difference in the lives of our students!

TWO YEARS AGO, SHE ASKED OVER SOCIAL MEDIA IF ANYONE HAD ANY UNWANTED FABRICS TO DONATE, WHAT HAPPENED NEXT IS AMAZING!

Retired and still full of talent, Barbara Evans had an idea. After reading about a 100 year old woman sewing a dress a day and then donating them to those in need in Africa, Barbara knew that this was something she could do too! So, with the help and support of her family, she started her journey in Satwa buying as much fabric as she could carry home and started her Facebook page of "Rags to Riches". Through her page, Barbara reached out to her community and asked for any kind of fabric donations. The response she got was "unbelievable"!

Word got around fast! When Emirates Airlines found out that Barbara was making fleece hoodies out of donated Emirates blankets and sending them off to Syria, Emirates got on board to help too! One month later, Emirates Airlines donated 3,500 blankets towards Barbara's project! Other companies have helped out too, but wish to remain anonymous.

Barbara had no idea her dream could get this big! In just two years, "Rags to Riches" has grown to 17 ladies sewing around the city, as well as, more overseas from the UK, to the USA, and to New Zealand. In the beginning was difficult, but now her creations are finding their way to the children who need them with the help of charities here in Dubai.

However, Barbara is not just keeping her talents to herself. She's recently come back from Turkey, where she and 5 others have shared their skills with 30 Syrian women on how to make blankets, bags and clothes. With that trip being such a success, Barbara's already planning another teaching trip to Nepal to help the ladies there.

Barbara will always remember the Green Community as being the first ones involved in fulfilling her dream. "I will always be grateful to them, and I am sure that they will continue to help!"
