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During the holidays a group of Secondary students undertook a Global Outreach trip to Tanzania. We have an ongoing relationship with a school there and contributed towards the construction of a classroom last year. This year our students plastered and painted the walls and in the process they engaged with communities whose needs are very different to ours. Expeditions like these are a wonderful opportunity for our students to expand their horizons and to engage with people who may be poorer in material terms but have a great deal to give in other ways. Trips such as this require a great deal of preparation and planning and I am looking forward to hearing their account of the trip in assembly. A huge word of thanks to Theresa Cormican who stepped in to cover for Andrew Ritter at the last minute.

Activities such as these not only foster international mindedness, but involve taking risks, whether in a traveling or cultural context. One of the Learner Profile characteristics of an IB Student is that of being a risk taker. The trip was, for most of the students a step into the unknown and an introduction to a new part of the world and community. As many of you know, rock climbing is my passion, and that involves taking risks, managing hazards and being safety conscious, I have been an active climber for well over thirty years. There is a world of difference between being foolhardy and impulsive, and taking acceptable risks.

Ibn Battuta sailing off into the unchartered waters, Nelson Mandela wearing the green rugby jersey in 1995, the Wright brothers launching their first aircraft, all were well aware of the risks they faced. Being a pioneer involves the possibility of failure.

As they camped out in the African bush students and teachers got to know one another in different contexts and situations. Friendships were forged and strengthened. There need to be challenges in the lives of our children, tough times and difficult experiences teach resilience, develop character and are the anvil upon which well-rounded and compassionate adults are forged.

Real Life Learning and Experiential Learning: week without walls

This year our students have been to Tanzania and are heading off soon to Ethiopia. It is wonderful to hear them their experiences and talk about what they have learnt.









Next year we plan to expand this further and some students will be partaking on the inaugural GCS Snow in February. In connection with this we are taking students to learn to ski at Ski Dubai as an ECA. We also have students doing diving.

In January 2016 we would like to look at coordinating local trips so all MYP grades potentially could be out on local trips at the same time. We hope to focus part of a week on experiential learning across the MYP from grades 6-10.

Real Life Learning

Our students should be very aware that there will be questions in their examinations that are unfamiliar to them. As in real life they are expected to apply learning from one context to another. To recognise and apply knowledge and skills in a new situation, which is foreign to us at first, is a key skill in preparing us for the future world of work.

For example, math learning that is seen by students as isolated skills and concepts simply to pass a test is limiting and ultimately leads to limited or short-term learning.

If math teachers are exposing their students to real-life math, they are giving them the opportunity to contextualize the learning, they are giving learning a relevance and ultimately giving students the opportunity to develop their critical thinking skills, reasoning and communication.

For example, they might apply measurement skills and concepts from the classroom to a football pitch or designing a house. That might lead to explorations of labour and transportation costs and other practicalities.

Combining science and math might lead to explorations of Google Sky and measuring the stride and speed of Usain Bolt on the athletics track.

Learning by doing, or authentic learning, is not a new concept. At one time children prepared for the world of work through apprenticeships and developing a trade. Times have changed, but that vital link between the classroom theory and real life contexts and real world application remains absolutely crucial. For some students activities and simply getting out of their seats, helps students who learn best by kinesthetic applications to succeed. For others it is the process of carrying out the activity for themselves rather than listening to instructions that helps. How many of us can learn a new program on the computer from just reading instructions in a book? Or how many of us prefer playing around with it and learning by trial and error?

When I was at school, I can remember how confusing and frustrating it was because the lack of real world application. I remember the lingering question that was always in my mind – how is this going to help me in the future?



creatively working on separate projects. We have seen some fantastic desk organisers, mirrors, clocks and iPad cases. But the highlight has been the success of one of the grade 10 projects.

Every morning and every evening the predominant sound around the school is the chirping of birds, busy trying to find a suitable spot to build their nests. Last term grade 10 Design Technology students were asked to design and make a unique bird house that could be displayed around the school, allowing the birds a safe and comfortable place to build their nests. Each student set about researching the types of birds around the school, where to put the bird houses and suitable materials that could be used. In all the students spent about six weeks researching and designing until they came up with the perfect solution.

The construction phase tested the students' technical and practical skills while they used a variety of hand and power tools. Each student took risks with their designs all vying to have the most unique birdhouse in the school. After about six weeks the birdhouses were complete and placed on some spots around the school.

Within a week the birds flocked and raced to claim their territory in one of the bird houses. Currently there are around twenty birdhouses which are all occupied. All students have commented on how happy they are to see the product that they designed and made being used. They are now seeing the fruits of their labour.


Art News: Miss Lauren Dixon

It was also a pleasure to watch other grade levels take inspiration from the exhibition, and listen to their informed conversations of individually justified thoughts and opinions.
















Grade 4

In the Unit of Inquiry Grade 4 students have been learning about how the body systems work together and how to take care for each system. Grade 4 did an interesting experiment in which the students recorded and analysed their pulse and respiration rate while standing still and then after exercising. Objective of the experiment was to give reasons why the pulse and respiration rate changes when we exercise.


Language focus has been reciprocal reading and explanation writing. In Reciprocal we learnt how to do various jobs like clarify, predict, summarize and become a questioner while reading. We also did a reading comprehension on the heart and wrote an explanation text about the respiratory system.

In Math Grade 4 has been learning about metric units of length, weight and capacity. We are also learning the strategy to convert these units. We have been mastering subtraction using horizontal partitioning method and are also creating word problems on subtraction.

We have had many guest speakers for this unit. Our guest speaker was an author who spoke to the students about narrative writing and improving our writing skills. He talked about different elements of a story. We also had a brain gym instructor as our guest speaker who spoke to the students about brain training. She taught our students various exercises and steps they can take to focus and improve their concentration.



The Arabic team also managed to introduce active learning in a very effective way, which made a remarkable difference in the progress and attainment of students in PYP:

1. **Acting**: Third grade students were doing roles of the fruit seller and the buyer, as a way to create real life sketches and situations to reflect what they have been learning in class.





WITH THE SUPPORT OF HIS PARENTS AND THE GUIDANCE OF HIS DEDICATED COACH, ABDULLAH ZELJO ACCOMPLISHED MILE-STONE AFTER MILESTONE, FAR SURPPASSING HIS EXPECTATIONS!

If you saw how many medals he's won, you would think that grade 11 GCS student, Abdullah Zeljo, has been training to swim competitively since his toddler years, but that's hardly the case. Only after being well into his teen-age years and overweight, Abdullah started training competitively, and has now become an accomplished gold medalist swimmer!

Admitting that swimming can be one of the hardest Olympic sports to train for, Abdullah was the only one in his family who enjoyed swimming lap after lap.

So who was his inspiration? Abdullah gives a lot of credit to his coach, Konstantin Bushmelov, back in his home country of Bosnia. Abdullah remembers his coach pushing every swimmer beyond their limits. Even after winning 5 gold medals in his first nationals, Abdullah's coach nudged him to swim even better. However, Abdullah is grateful to his coach for believing in him and showing him how to be the best he could be.

One of the hardest parts in getting to his goal was when Abdullah had injured his shoulder and still had to compete. He accounts the pain being almost unbearable, but he remembers the support of his parents, coach and close friends that helped push him through it. And with that, Abdullah managed to beat all his personal records in his races.

Abdullah never imagined he would go this far in swimming, but he was determined. Even after feeling intimidated in his very first nationals race, Abdullah set a goal not be last. "I wanted to come and make others take that place. That was my dream, and I did just that." He also managed to beat the fastest known swimmer in Bosnia for his age group and won first place! "I never felt so proud and thankful."

When asked what advice Abdullah had to give to the students and family of GCS, he stuck by the phrase to "Never give up!" On behalf of the GCP and our school, we are so proud of Abdullah for living his dream!
