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## From the Principal's Desk

It is with both well-wishes and sadness that I write to you this week. For our Muslim families and staff we wish you Eid Mubarak, especially for those families who have a member undertaking Hajj. It is with great sadness that we received the news of the tragic passing of His Highness Sheikh Rashid bin Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum. To lose a child must certainly be the greatest shock

and hardship that can befall a father or mother and our thoughts and prayers are with the Al Maktoum family at this time.

We have held a number of very successful parent information sessions in recent weeks. The Grade 5 camp, our Global Outreach projects to Tanzania and Ethiopia, an introduction to the PYP, a presentation from our caterers, coffee mornings, to name but some. These have been very well attended and do a great deal to strengthen the parent-school relationship.

Last week I had the opportunity to attend this year's Digital Education conference. It not only showcased the latest technologies and apps, but gave a platform for school and universities to showcase what they are doing. I believe that when it comes to technology and IT, it is better to be second wave. Let others try the new technologies, listen and learn about what works and which ones were the expensive mistakes and then make your investments.

Of particular interest was a round table discussion on digital citizenship. When adults give children smartphones they are giving them a piece of technology that requires a high level of ethical responsibility. A generation ago if two children had an argument the words were never written down with a signature. These technologies we expose our children to mean that their digital footprint is permanent. There is a growing movement in Europe calling for the right to be forgotten. The presenter told a story of a 14 year old boy in the UK who recently took some inappropriate photographs of his girlfriend and forwarded them to a friend. He has now been put on a police database because the girl was under 18. Therefore if a CRB check was to be conducted, he would appear to be an unsavory candidate. We have all done foolish things in our youth, learnt from them and are grateful that they are in the past. Should young people have the right to have the mistakes of their youth forgotten?

At the centre of our discussion was the question of who is responsible for educating our children about the wise use of smartphone technology and who should bear responsibility when they make foolish mistakes? At GCS we have a well-planned programme presented by Mrs. Amun Quershi, our Head of Technology Integration, which raises the students' awareness of responsible digital citizenship, cyberbullying and privacy protection. Surely the responsibility for our children's education must rest firstly with the adult who gave the technology to the child. It would, obviously, be hugely irresponsible to give our powerful motor car without first giving them advanced safety training. When we give our

children smartphones we give them unlimited access to the internet which has some dark corners that are fascinating to curious teenagers. They will be bombarded with social media. Businesses and salespeople are very adept in identifying and attracting the youth market and targeting our children's buying power. Unscrupulous people are on the lookout for private data: social security numbers, ID numbers, and so on. Unwary children are both all too curious and trusting.

The rules of the game and the power of technology are evolving fast. Don't assume that your children are naïve or that the school is 100% responsible when it comes to responsible digital citizenship education. Talk to your children about these issues, monitor what is on their phones, check the browsing history. Have you set and checked the security and privacy settings, have they set up a VPN, and so on? There is a great deal that is good, too. Parents can now track their children's movements to the meter (as can wives their husbands!). Schools and families need to work in partnership to protect, guide and educate our children.

# **IBCP (International Baccalaureate Career-related Programme)**

This year's new intake to the IBCP (International Baccalaureate Career related Programme) have made a flying start. We have 22 students in our Grade 11 which means we are now full for this year. This is exciting when you consider we started with 6 back in 2010, and now we have 38 in both grades. The Grade 11 is made up of students who were at GCS last year in Grade 10, plus 11 students who are new to the school. Offering 2 pathways in Grade 11, the IB Diploma and IBCP is exciting for GCS and gives our students a definite choice of study. For anyone new to GCS, the IBCP course is offered in Grade 11 & 12 alongside the IB Diploma course. Students study 3, IB Diploma subjects, the IBCP 'Core' which includes work placement, ATL, Community & Service, & Language Development, plus the BTEC National Diploma at Level 3 in a subject of their choice. GCS were one of the first pilot schools in 2010 across the world, where there are now over 90 schools delivering the programme. It is intended to offer students a course specifically tailored to their chosen career pathway.

As part of the IBCP course, students are required to study an additional course to the ID Diploma subjects. This must be an externally validated and authorised course as directed by the IB. At GCS we decided to offer the BTEC (Business & Technical Education Council) which is recognised across the world and at Level 3, gives our students the opportunity to meet the entry requirements for University degree courses when they complete the full IBCP. This year, GCS have introduced a new BTEC, the Level 3 Creative Art & Design course. This gives students the opportunity to study subjects such as Art, Graphics, DT Product Design, Media, Photography, Fashion & Textiles, Jewellery Design, Interior Design. Added to the existing BTEC Level 3 Diploma in Business, this offers our students a wide range of subjects with more being planned for future years.

Since the introduction of the IBCP course, our students have enjoyed great success and have been able to gain places at universities around the world. To date we have 25 students who have graduated with 24 studying in countries such as US, Canada, UK,

Holland, Singapore & the UAE. Another student is now working in Agriculture in his native country, South Africa.

  where she has also gained a full scholarship having been recognised in the top 100 of international BTEC students.
- Varun Ahuja studying a degree in sports management at Bournemouth University in the UK
- Ghaith Al Saseh studying a degree in hospitality management at The Emirates Hospitality Academy, Dubai
- Yanniek Heijkoop studying a degree in media at Middlesex University, Dubai campus
- Estelle Cooper is taking a gap year before studying a degree at Heriot Watt University, Dubai Campus
- James Hanson entered employment in engineering and will be completing part time study at Heriot Watt University, Dubai campus
- Rami Aldada studying a foundation degree course at Heriot Watt University, Dubai campus.

Work placement is a vital part of the IBCP course where students complete 3, 1 week internships during the 2 year course. Students arrange their own placements at companies in their chosen career paths. We are always searching for companies who are willing to take our students, so please contact Mr. Worth, IBCP Coordinator on <a href="mworth@gcschool.ae">mworth@gcschool.ae</a> if you are able to help. Students are fully monitored during the week and have to complete a detailed case study as part of their studies. Therefore the week is very important to them.

Usually, though, the mood at GCS is positive, and it certainly seems to be so, currently.

Occasionally, news filters through concerning students from the last cohort, the Graduating Class of 2015. The Grade 11 students are beginning to find their feet although some students have yet to feel that they have a subject programme with which they feel entirely comfortable. They need to remember, though, that course changes cannot be made after October 11th. But they have joined the huge, and growing, number of students worldwide who have committed themselves to the IB Diploma Programme.



#### Parents new to the PYP Information Session



Last Thursday the Primary School held the first Coffee Morning of the academic year with the focus on supporting parents who are new to the Primary Years Programme at the school. A great turn out from parents saw them working collaboratively in groups to ask questions about the programme and find out more, supporting their understanding of how it works.

Parents modelled some strategies that are used in classrooms such as one we call 'Think, Pair, Share'. This is where a student is given time to think about the answer to a question individually, then they explain their thinking with a partner, and listen to their partner's ideas too, and finally share with the group. Parents did this when discussing curriculum content they thought students should learn, and also to see if there were commonalities between their questions.

A short video was shown highlighting the Learner Profile which emphasised the type of learners we strive for our students to be, learning and developing in an environment which is safe and secure enough for risk-taking to take place and for mistakes to be made.

Students must feel confident enough to try new experiences without fear of failure, which is particularly important for our students whose first language is not English. A range of questions were used to help develop the next steps of parental need in order to support understanding. Once again, reflecting the practice in class, by finding out what parents already know and where to take their understanding next.

Please come and join us for the next parent information session. Focus and venue will be sent out nearer the time. All questions asked at the session will be sent out via school communication.

In Grade 2 we had an Essential Agreements rotation, where each class made a list of Essential Agreements for a specific area around the school.


This gave every child the chance to be reflective and find ways for everyone to be **Principled** when using the different spaces in school.

# **Advisory Board**

The Advisory School Board can also make recommendations to the Taaleem Policy Committees for changes in Taaleem Foundation Board Policies.

The mission statement of the Advisory School Board is that it exists to act in the best interest of the students, parents, community and staff towards the purpose of excellence in education and as such, in this regard, the Advisory School Board shall act in an advisory and supportive capacity to the Principal.

The Advisory Board is made up of a Chairman, who is not part of the staff compliment of Greenfield Community School nor Taaleem. The Chair and the Principal are supported by a representative of the Taaleem Governing Board, the GCP Chairperson, a PYP staff representative, an MYP staff representative, along with the Head of Primary and Head of Secondary. Dear parents and respected audience,

As most of you know there is an important event coming up that Muslims all over the world will be celebrating in the next couple of days.

Eid Al Adha, A feast that is significantly recognized in the Islamic culture and history.
