## From the Principal's Desk

Dear Parents,

Heraclitus, the Greek philosopher, once said that 'you cannot stand in the same river twice.' Things are always changing and we cannot expect them to remain the same. This is as true today as it was many millennia ago, probably more so. Our school is

growing, and our challenge is to ensure that it is better than its previous best and that the changes are headed in a positive direction.

This week we hosted a quality assurance team from two organisations: the Council for International Schools and the New England Association of Schools and Colleges. Whilst our regular DSIB and International Baccalaureate reviews are mandatory, these visitors were here by invitation. We want an objective view of our school's strengths and weakness as a starting point to take the school forward. They have undertaken an in-depth view of the school, based on a review of the school's documentation, lesson observations and focussed meetings with students, staff, parents and governors. Accreditation from CIS/NEASC will follow a thorough self-evaluation process that will take 12-18 months, we are accredited it will mean that our internal examinations will be recognised for admission to North American universities and colleges.

The visitors were very impressed by the school in general and whilst we await the written report, I am confident that we will receive the endorsement to move on to the next stage of the accreditation process. They were very positive about the school's alignment with its Vision and Mission and the clear commitment to the International Baccalaureate and internationalism. Our students made us proud, speaking with great insight about the strengths of an IB education, how our school is a genuinely warm, welcoming and inclusive place. They expressed gratitude for what the school has done for them. 'In my 17 years of school visits, this is as impressive a group of students as I have ever seen in any school anywhere', was one comment. Our parents expressed that they are active, engaged and feel empowered and valued. There was a recognition of how hard-working the staff is, our united commitment to the principles of an IB education and the breadth of the curriculum. Our SEN, EAL and Mother Tongue programmes were highlighted as features of the school. We are a school that celebrates its diversity and regards its inclusivity as a strength. The Governing Body is sincerely committed to the school and Taaleem's vision and mission, to school improvement and to supporting the school in that journey. They were impressed by our IT provision and systems, Proactive, Managebac and Sisra in particular. There is an atmosphere of support, fairness, trust and respect in the school.




**Dear Parents**



#### **Understanding Study Hall at GCS**

Study Hall is an after-school compulsory study session that students receive for the following reasons:

- 1. Missed an assessment deadline (no extensions policy).
- Student has displayed several instances of having poor approaches to learning (uniform, punctuality, equipment /homework).
- 3. Students' behaviour has not been in line with our expectations (see Parent Handbook on the school website).

The student is required to stay in school for one hour after school in the supervised Study Hall and either catch up on the work they've not completed or reflect on their behaviour or attitudes. It runs on a Monday and Wednesday from 14.30-15.30 for MYP and 15.30-16.30 for Grades 11-12.

This concept was introduced in the academic year 2012-2013 and has worked well in ensuring challenge, accountability and rigour for students. Although, sometimes seen as a punitive measure, it is a system put in place to ensure your child achieves their personal best, that your child knows that actions or inactions have consequences and that reflection is a key part of self-improvement. We, as a team of teachers, have seen dramatic changes in the students since we've introduced this system and appreciate your support as parents, in helping us help your child.

A recap of what to expect per Grade Level:

#### Grade 6 and 7

Students who have accumulated three of the same offence from the above listed offences in a term will receive a Study Hall

In term 2, three of any offence will warrant a Study Hall.

#### Grade 8, 9 and 10

Students who have accumulated any three offences in a term will receive a Study Hall.

#### Grade 11 and 12

Students who have accumulated any two offences in a term will receive a Study Hall.



With the interim reports being made available at the end of this month I would like to take this opportunity to remind us all of the Approaches to Learning (ATLs) on which the students will also be assessed. The ATLs are a refinement of the MYP Curriculum which has undergone extensive review and constitute a very important part of a student's learning.

Each student is therefore expected to develop in the following five areas of the ATL:

- Communication in which Communication skills such as the student's ability to use
  active listening techniques to understand others and to give and receive appropriate feedback.
- Social in which the student is expected to develop collaboration skills which involve things such as respect for and acceptance of socio-cultural differences and the ability to exercise empathy.
- Self-Management Involving organizational skills, reflective skills and affective skills which involve things such as demonstrating persistence and perseverance as well as being able to practice focus and concentration to overcome distractions.
- Research- which looks at student's information literacy and media literacy skills.
- Thinking in which students exercise critical thinking, creative thinking and transfer skills. The latter focusing on the application of their thinking with things such as using their knowledge, understanding and skills across subjects to create products or solutions and making connections between learning gained in different subject areas

Clearly, each of the ATLs have several more strands or foci, each of which is carefully built into the student's learning journey.

Throughout the MYP we are committed to the IB mandate of making sure that we develop students who are:

Active learners

Internationally minded

Able to empathize with others

Have the intellect and skills to pursue lives of purpose and meaning.

As a parent and an educator, I can't think of a better approach to holistic learning.

Dear Parents,



In these last few days, we have reached one of the first key milestones of the new academic year given a Preliminary visit from CIS/NEASC. Your children may well have come home talking about how they had visitors in their classrooms, asking them about their learning. We were privileged to have been visited by three experienced people with a wealth of International leadership experience, whose principal goal was to help us begin a cycle of self-evaluation and ensure that our children are receiving the highest quality of learning. The whole experience has been a positive one, and now, we move on the next stage in our accreditation cycle; more details on this will be revealed in the near future.

A lot of hard work has been evident this term in the form of some extensive assessments, as well as the beginning of our first UOI, and not to mention the huge effort that our staff have all put in to ensure the learning environments, both inside and outside the classrooms are colorful and stimulating. Their commitment and dedication is greatly appreciated.

I know that some of you are familiar with the accreditation process (through previous school experiences) but for those of you who aren't, let me take this opportunity to explain this to you in a nutshell.

CIS (Council of International Schools) is a membership community that works collaboratively to shape international education through professional services to schools, higher education institutions, and individuals. The CIS community includes more than 660 schools and 475 colleges and universities representing 109 countries.

Founded in 1885, the **New England Association of Schools & Colleges, Inc. (NEASC)**, is a very well established accrediting association whose mission is the establishment and maintenance of high standards for all levels of education, from pre-K to the doctoral level.

The CIS/NEASC accreditation process looks at all aspects of school life and in conjunction with our IB re-authorisation, teaching and learning is at the very heart of it. However, the process also involves looking at a wider variety of aspects of school life for example; *Governance & Leadership, Faculty & Support Staff* and *Operational Systems*, all of which have a direct impact on the school community. We should in essence view the accreditation process as the vehicle for school improvement.

I would like to place on record my sincere thanks to those parents and members of the Student Council who were involved, not only over the last few days, but several months ago when the initial process of planning for the Preliminary visit began. Your input has been highly valued.

#### The Child Development Programme at GCS: Ms Louise Allen

Last Thursday afternoon, 1st October 2015, GCS hosted a workshop in which parents from The Children's Garden Green Community, (TCG) and parents from GCS, came together to learn more about The Child Development Programme. This programme is being implemented Taaleem wide throughout all early year classes (3-6year olds) and it will focus on 3 main areas of development; Movement, Language and Perceptual Thinking.



Through structured activities, which are provided in a pack, teachers are able to assess each student in the 3 areas as described above. Parents are also welcome to purchase the packs to use at home.

The Child Development Programme was designed by Dr Madeleine Portwood, an Educational Psychologist from the UK, and she has over 20 years of experience in this area. She is working in collaboration with Ebdaah, a company based here in Dubai, and along with Taaleem, are implementing the programme this academic year.
